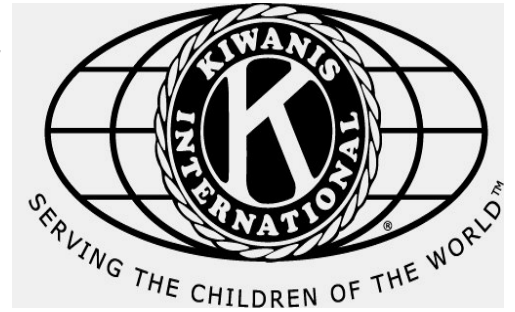

9. Builder's Club

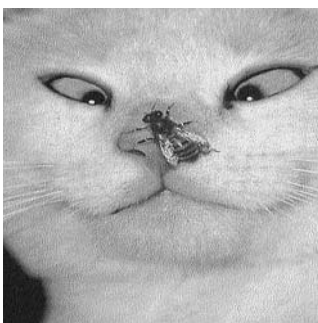
